When a person files a claim for benefits, our system attempts to match certain information with the records of the Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). We have established procedures when information does not match. We then request that the person appear before a Notary Public and complete the affidavit of identity.

You are being sent the identification verification form, as there was a discrepancy in the match between the records held by the Department of Motor Vehicles and the information you provided us via the telephone or Internet claim process. We apologize for the delay in your benefits and assure you this is necessary to safeguard against the improper use of your wage credits by others.

Should you file for unemployment benefits in the future, you may be asked to verify your identity again.

This can occur for one of three reasons:

You do not hold a Nevada Driver's License or Identification Card.

You may have moved out of state and your Drivers License or Identification card has expired.

Your records at the DMV do not contain the same information you provided to this Division, which could include misspelling of your mother's maiden name.

If you were mailed the form due to a discrepancy with the information that the DMV has on file, we ask that you contact them to update their records to prevent this mismatch of information in the future.

We apologize for any inconvenience and ask that you remember that this process was designed to protect your unemployment benefits from being claimed by persons other than yourself.
